FROM THE FOUNDERS

It is our great pleasure to introduce the 2021 Harding Miller Education Foundation Annual Report. The year 2021 was again a very challenging year with ongoing disruption due to the Covid 19 pandemic. However, we are extremely proud of the successes of our scholars and the Foundation.

Our 2021 scholars faced a very difficult year as they were forced to learn remotely for an extended period. The Harding Miller team and our supporters worked tirelessly to support the girls during these unprecedented times. Thank you to all our supporters including our wonderful donors, volunteers, coaches, judges, ambassadors, enrichment partners, suppliers, and the dedicated school staff that support the scholarship recipients.

In 2021 we had 438 scholars on our program across Australia including 67 studying Year 12. These Year 12 girls had to prepare for exams in an uncertain and largely online learning environment. We are so proud of all the girls for their hard work, resilience and dedication to their studies.

Well done to our Managing Director, Cara Varian who was recognised as an Impact 25 Pro Bono Australia winner. These leaders were selected from 400 nominations and were chosen because of their innovation, influence and collaboration - leaders who help make the world a better place in a time of uncertainty. Congratulations to one of our Alumni, Sabina Patawaran, who launched a wonderful toolkit called ARK (Anti-Racism Kit) to help high school students understand racism and combat it within their communities.

The Scholarship program continues to grow in scope and sophistication. This year we held 31 enrichment events and we were very pleased to expand these opportunities beyond NSW.

The introduction of career development to the scholarship program in 2021 was very well received and we hope that this will provide the girls with the resources and tools they need to follow their tertiary education goals and future career paths.

It is a great pleasure to have a wonderful partnership with the Quinn Femelle Private Ancillary Fund and other significant supporters. Our expansion in Queensland has been significant and it will be exciting to see the success for these girls in the years ahead. Together we are changing the trajectory of high potential girls in Australia and giving them a bright future.

FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

It seems impossible to avoid acknowledging the impact that COVID-19 has had – on both a global and a personal scale. During this time, the clear disparity between schools in Australia became even more obvious – and even harder to ignore. None of it was easy for the educators and school staff but it was clear that those students attending a well-resourced school swiftly moved to online learning, but many public-school students were left floundering as their school did not have the resources or personnel to change quickly.

On top of these resource and skills challenges, the schools with high proportions of students from low socio-economic backgrounds also lacked a student body with unencumbered access to technology and a reliable internet connection.

In this context, we saw the Harding Miller Education Foundation Scholarships work harder than ever. The scholarship model designed to be effective in every urban, regional and rural environment in Australia transitioned effectively to a new environment, remote learning. The technological, academic, financial, and personal support provided by this multi-layered and personalised scholarship changed the experience of the scholarship recipients. Instead of the disconnection and dejection sadly experienced by so many Australian students from low socio-economic circumstances, they were connected and bolstered.

Scholarship recipients had a myriad of complex issues to overcome, including homelessness, care of extended family members, poverty, overcrowded homes, and domestic violence. For many of the scholarship recipients, being at school is safer and more hopeful than their homes. In these difficult times, the program team and our volunteer coaches went above and beyond. We significantly increased the amount of contact we had with the girls.

The objective was to identify issues early and where it was possible to alleviate some of the impacts of these difficulties we did. Importantly, the tools of the scholarship kept the students connected to their schools, their teachers, and their peers. It meant they kept engaged with their education and able to progress their academic achievements.

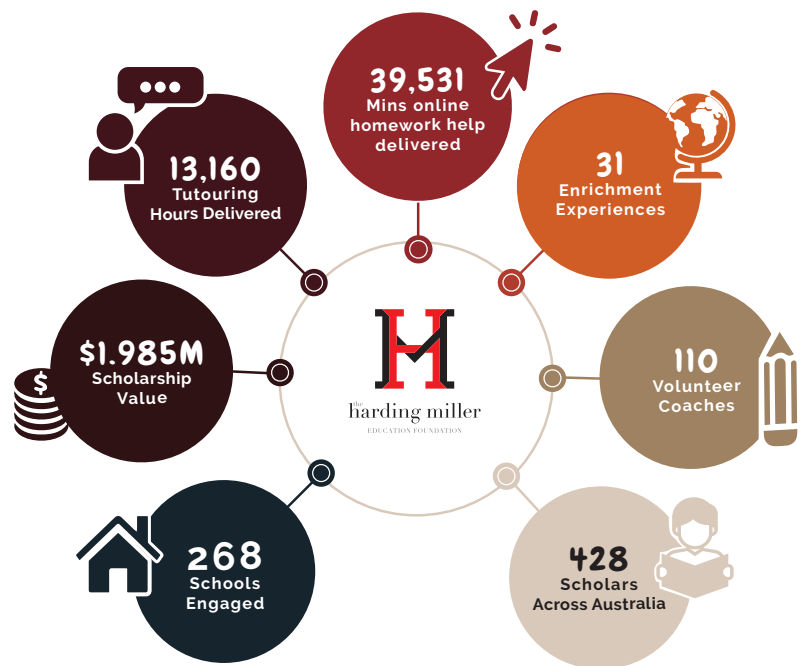

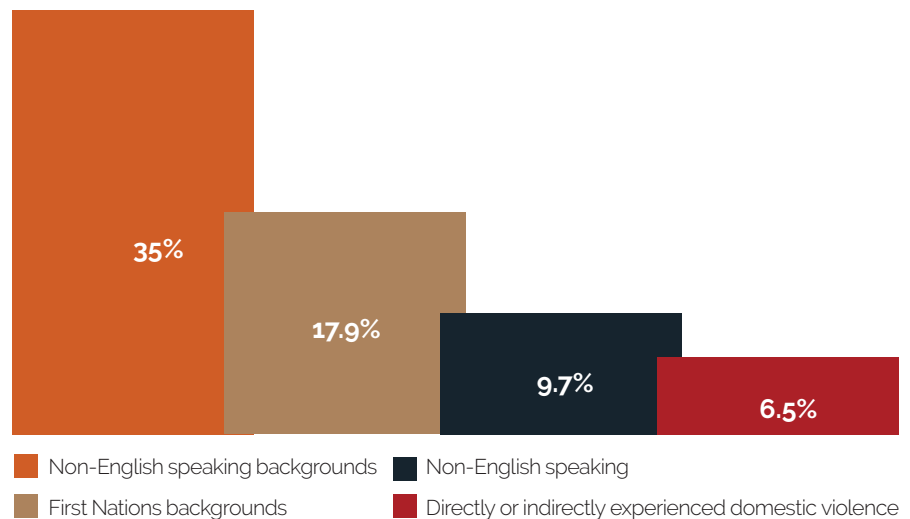
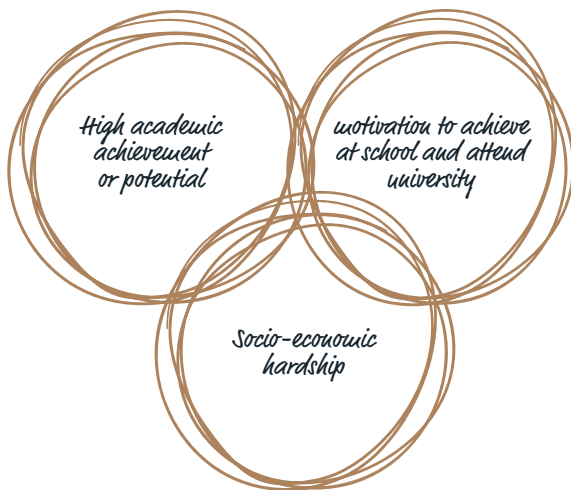

Who do we support?

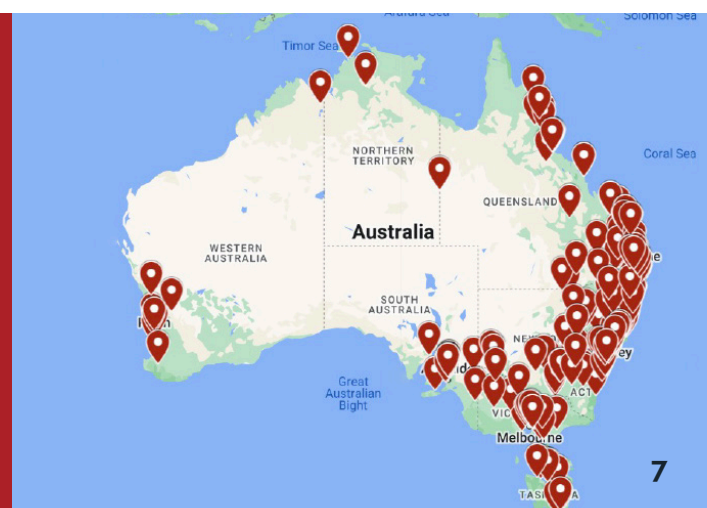
We support girls from all backgrounds who are studying Year 9 to Year 12 at Australian public schools in every state and territory. We are looking for three attributes when selecting students to be a part of the scholarship program. In 2021 the Harding Miller Education Foundation had many scholars identify from non-English speaking backgrounds, First Nations, those experiencing out of home care and those having directly or indirectly experienced domestic violence.



There was a total of 428 scholars on the program in 2021 from Years 9-12 and they were located in every state and territory of Australia as can be seen from the map.

In 2021, 30.4% of scholarship recipients lived in rural and regional Australia.

- 65.3% scholars in metropolitan areas
- 30.4% in rural and regional areas
- 4.1% in remote areas



FOCUS – OUR FIRST NATIONS SCHOLARS

The Harding Miller Education Foundation is contributing to achieving equality of education opportunity and achievement for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. The scale of educational inequality remains vast for Australia's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and continues.

The Foundation works with schools and local communities to identify our First Nations girls and encourages them to apply for the Harding Miller Education Scholarship each year.

In 2021, 18% of our scholarship recipients identify as First Nations Australians. We have the great privilege of working with and learning from First Nations volunteers who bring an important cultural and personal contribution to our coaching program and our scholarship selection process.

Lara, McKenzie and Alexis are Year 9 students at Kirwan State High School, Queensland, which is on Thul Garrie Waja and Gurrumbilbarra country. They are all supported by the Quinn Femelle Private Ancillary Fund.



LARA

Lara says that having the laptop and internet has greatly supported her in 2021 so she could complete assignments. She is interested in pursuing an exercise and sports science degree at James Cook University or the University of Queensland.

Cheyanna is in Year 9 at Tamworth High School in NSW, which is Kamilaroi country. She would like to be a teacher educating Aboriginal children in rural Australia when she leaves school. Cheyanna loves playing the guitar and also enjoys Tae Kwon Do. She lives in a single income family with her parents and has one sibling.

"Cheyanna is an extremely intelligent student who has shown a hard-working attitude towards all school activities. She has a passion and a career path in mind and despite numerous setbacks, she has remained positive and tries her hardest" School Principal.

LESCHEYAH JAMES AND CLANCIE CALWYN

Lescheyah and Clancie are both Year 9 students at East Kimberley College in Kununurra in Western Australia, which is on Doolboong and Miriwoong country.

Lescheyah was born in Mount Isa in Queensland on the traditional lands of the Kalkadoon people. She now attends East Kimberly College and lives nearby. She is in the top stream of her school and hopes to one day be a veterinarian. *"This scholarship will really help me and provides a computer and internet which I could never get without the scholarship. It will make me feel independent and support my family and goals for university".*

Clancie has 6 siblings that live in her household. She wants to be the first person in her family to go to university and would love to study sports science in Sydney. She also enjoys football, woodwork, physics and chemistry. Clancie was also elected onto the student council. *"I am really proud of this because there is only 3 students that get chosen and I got in because I always try my best and am a leader for my friends and help other people".*

Courtney is a high achieving student and would like to go to university to study a Bachelor of Education, Health and Physical Education.

GWENNETH RUMBEL

Gwen is a Year 10 student at Dungog High School in New South Wales, which is on Worimi country. She is committed to her academic studies and was dux in her primary school. Gwen aspires to achieve great results in her higher school certificate and attend university. *"I intend to make the most of the scholarship by continuing to aim high and let the resources it provides help me to become a better learner, better student and better role model.....I want to push myself and do my best in everything to prove that Aboriginal people are capable of great things".*



NAIOKA WELSH

Naioka is a Year 11 student at Goodooga Central School which is located 76kms south-west of Lightning Ridge on Kamilaroi country. The scholarship has assisted Naioka to further her academic pursuits and her goal is to go to Sydney University or the University of NSW to study a Bachelor of Social Work or a Bachelor of Teaching. She is very proud of her achievements in 2021 as she managed to keep on top of her attendance and classwork even during lockdown. *"The scholarship helped me stay connected to my teachers and the laptop allowed me access and complete my work". Naioka also enjoys playing the guitar,*

MEGHAN DAVIDSON

Meghan is a Year 11 student at Leeton High School in New South Wales, which is on Waradjuri country. She lives with her mother and sister. She has moved regularly in her young life from NSW to Western Australia to Victoria and then back to NSW. She is determined to go to university and is interested in a career in psychology, law or criminology. She also loves to sing and plays the piano. *"I have always been hard working and ambitious, the scholarship enhances my desire to succeed. I never thought I'd be able to attend university, but now with the scholarship I believe I can achieve my goals and my work ethic has intensified as I approach my senior years".*

FELICITY ELFORD

Felicity is a Year 12 student at Ballina Coast High School in New South Wales which is on Bunjalung country. She is a proud Aboriginal girl from the Dunghutti nation in Kempsey. She has 9 siblings and her mother is a single parent. *"The scholarship has been really helpful especially the laptop and internet. The tutoring also helped me and I thought my coach was great. She checked up on me regularly and was really nice and helpful with anything I needed."*

TAYLAH BOOTH

Taylor is a Year 12 student at Chifley College Senior Campus in Sydney, which is Dharug country. She is interested in studying at university and pursuing a career in Visual Art. Her school principal says that she continues to be extremely motivated and is a high achieving student who makes the most of her opportunities provided by the scholarship. *"The Foundation has allowed me to perform better in my academics through devices and opportunities the scholarship has provided to me. Every year I have been given the opportunity to visit places and speak with people at events which was a great experience"*.

THE SCHOLARSHIP



The Harding Miller Education Foundation is very proud to partner with the Quinn Femelle Private Ancillary Fund to provide Quinn scholarships for students in Queensland. Quinn Femelle is our most significant philanthropic partner. 2020 was the first year of the HMEF/Quinn alliance which resulted in 25 Queensland high school students beginning their four-year scholarship.

In 2021 the Quinn Femelle Private Ancillary Fund supported a further 30 girls and we are delighted that this partnership continues. This means that at least 25 Queensland girls each year will receive a life-changing scholarship. This very generous support will change the trajectory of high potential Queensland girls in need and give them an opportunity for a bright future.

Quinn scholarships are awarded to girls entering Year 9 at public high schools across Queensland. It is a four-year scholarship from Year 9 – Year 12.

Quinn Femelle is focused on supporting women and the progress of equal opportunity for those who are disadvantaged across Queensland. It supports long-term sustainable goals that target the future prosperity of Australians, and in particular Queenslanders. Its priority areas are health and education, especially in relation to children and youth.

2021 AWARDS EVENTS

The Foundation provided 150 scholarships to girls commencing in Year 9 in 2021. A series of Award events were planned for 2021 in Sydney, Brisbane, Perth, Adelaide, Melbourne and Hobart.

The Award events are a significant occasion for the scholars. It is often the first time many girls are introduced to their peers. The Foundation staff welcome the scholars and all girls are provided with information packs and important information. The scholars participate in enrichment and social activities during the day. In the evening, the scholars are officially welcomed into the Harding Miller Education Foundation program. The award ceremony function is a wonderful and inspiring event which features a Welcome to Country, a special guest speaker, entertainment and an official welcome from the Managing Director of the Foundation. It is a very special event where the girls invite their family to attend along with representatives from their school to witness them receiving their award certificates.

The Sydney event was held at the Sydney Town Hall on 31 May 2021 and 70 scholars were invited from NSW and ACT. The Brisbane event was held on 21 June 2021 at the State Library of Queensland and 30 scholars were invited to the event.

Unfortunately, due to the Covid 19 pandemic and lockdowns across Australia, the remaining events in Perth, Adelaide, Melbourne and Hobart had to be cancelled.

To ensure that all students had an award ceremony, an online ceremony was held in November and invitations were extended to the 50 scholars who would have otherwise attended one of the cancelled events.



OUR ENRICHMENT PROGRAM

Although the consequences of COVID-19 and the extensive national lockdowns throughout the middle of the year had an impact on the number of 'in person' enrichment activities, we were still able to provide opportunities to HMEF scholars during 2021 – with over 1100 hours of enrichment opportunities provided across a range of in-person and virtual experiences.

In total, we were able to facilitate the attendance of our scholars at 31 separate enrichment events. 2021 also saw the expansion of our in-person enrichment opportunities beyond the Sydney CBD and surrounds. We held our first interstate in-person enrichment event in Brisbane, which was a Experience Day at Ernst & Young. We partnered with the Queensland University of Technology to host two additional Queensland based events this year.

We also welcomed new enrichment partners including ABC News, Allen & Overy Law Firm and WOW Recruitment. In addition, we held our first Alumnae event with 10 HMEF alumna at a lunch hosted by Ernst & Young during International Women's Week in March.

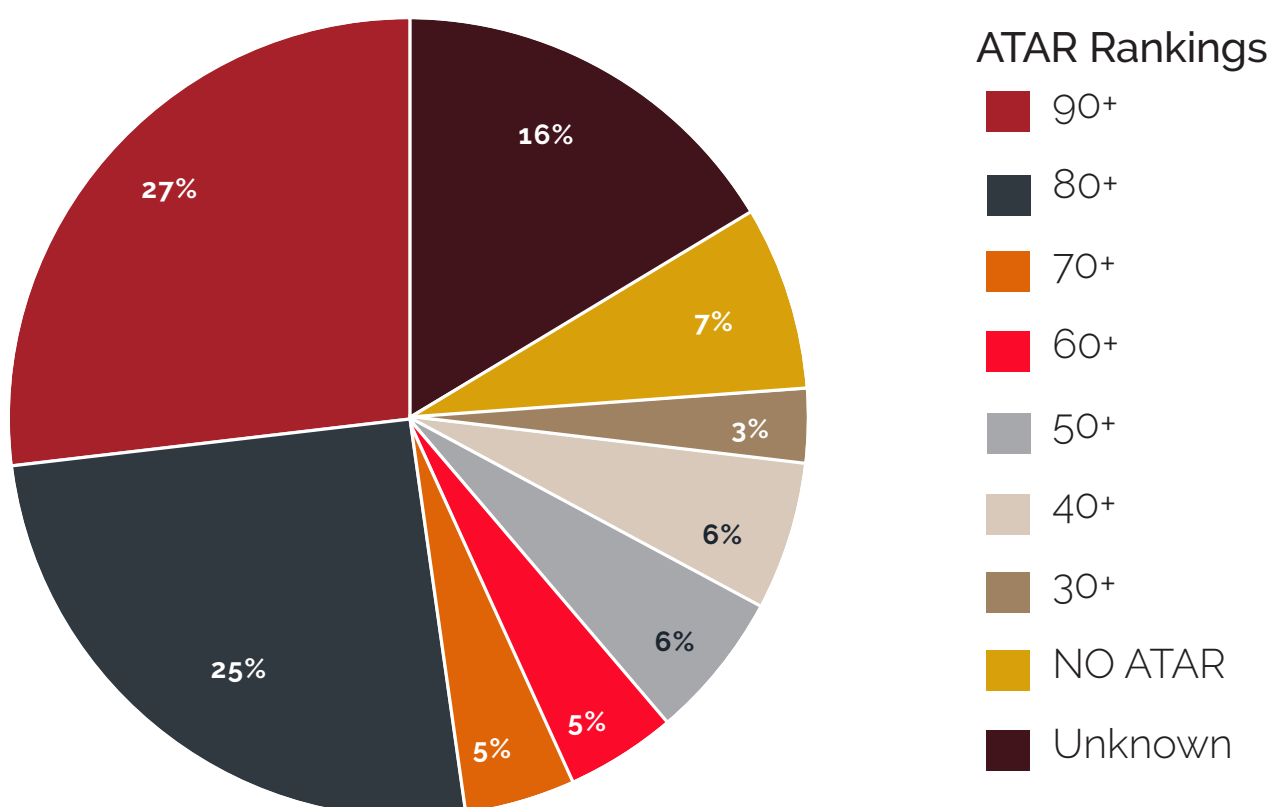
HSC RESULTS - CLASS OF 2021 NSW

Our third cohort of scholars – who were awarded scholarships starting in 2018 – completed their Higher School Certificate in 2021 and graduated from school. There were 67 Harding Miller Education Foundation scholars within our Class of 2021 that sat their HSC exams from 43 different NSW public high schools. 90% of our scholars indicated that they intended to study at university from 2022.

As a result of COVID-19, many universities offered early conditional offer schemes again in 2021. Through these schemes, students apply and are offered university places before sitting their final HSC exams as their applications are assessed on criteria other than their ATAR. It was pleasing that 49% of our scholars indicated that they had received at least one or more early conditional offers from universities.

The highest ATAR achieved was 99.95, the highest possible score – indicating that this scholar's performance was in the top 0.05 per cent of the entire state of New South Wales.

18 scholars (27%) received an ATAR ranking 90.00 or over and a further 17 (25%) received an ATAR ranking of 80.00 or over. This means that, when combined, a total of 52% of the scholars that received ATAR rankings that were in the top 20% of NSW. This is a remarkable achievement bearing in mind this cohort endured many difficulties due to Covid-19 and absences from school.



YEAR 12 ACHIEVERS

Congratulations to the 27 scholars who have been recognised as all round, high and distinguished achievers who achieved a mark of 90 or above in specific subjects. Two of our scholars were recognised as All Round Achievers. All Round Achievers are those who attained 90 or above (Band 6 or Band E4) in at least ten units of study. Two scholars were also recognised as Top Achievers. Top achievers are those who achieved one of the highest places in a HSC course of VET examination and also achieved a result in the highest band (Band 6 or Band E4). 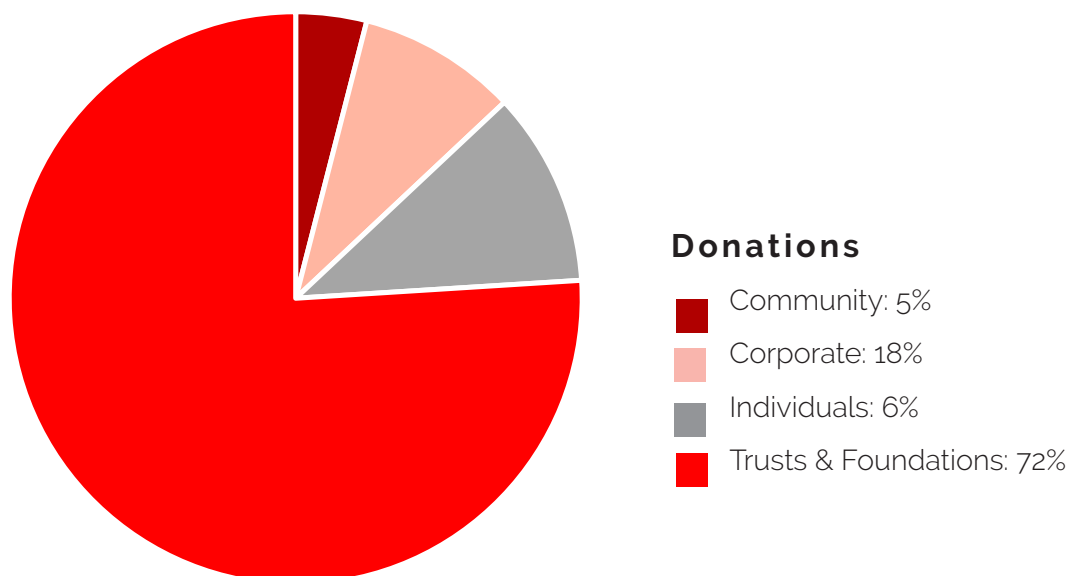
