WHY DOES THE FOUNDATION ONLY SUPPORT GIRLS?

There is clear evidence of the link between educating women and the alleviation of poverty in society. When women and girls earn income, they reinvest 90% of it into their families, compared with 30-40% for a man. Girls face many barriers to getting an education that boys do not. Educating women results in strong economies, reduced poverty for children and families and will have a significant impact in reducing the gender gap and elevating women to an equal status of men in society.



FROM THE FOUNDERS

It is our great pleasure to introduce the 2022 Harding Miller Education Foundation Annual Report. In 2022 we were relieved that students in Australian schools had an uninterrupted year of schooling for the first time in two years. The impact of the pandemic on students, schools and all of us has been profound. We know that the impact and disparity between schools became obvious during the past couple of years due to lockdowns when all students were forced to learn remotely. The impact on students and schools was much greater for those disadvantaged, vulnerable or who lived in remote areas.

The disparity between schools was enormous. It was clear that students attending well-resourced schools more easily adapted to online learning due to their high-level resources while many public schools were not well equipped. Of course, public schools also have the highest proportion of students from low socio-economic backgrounds, so this coupled with technology issues saw many students and schools struggle.

It was encouraging to witness the positive outcomes achieved through the scholarship program during this time. Our girls were supported. The scholarship model was designed to be effective in every location in Australia, so our scholars were able to effectively learn due to access to remote learning, e.g. laptop, data, tutoring and many other resources including daily support from our wonderful program team and volunteers.

In 2022 we had 513 scholars on our program across Australia including 73 studying Year 12. We are extremely proud of all the Year 12 students who worked hard and gained excellent results - 95% of Year 12 scholars indicated that they are pursuing tertiary studies. Many of our scholars continue to be the first in their family to either finish school or attend tertiary education.

It was wonderful to be able to hold award ceremony events again in 2022 and to meet our scholars and their families in person. We held three events in 2022 - Adelaide, Brisbane and Sydney. These events are designed to recognise publicly the worth of the students and give them positive recognition for their academic achievements and ambitions.

The scholarship program continues to grow with enhanced resources and enrichment opportunities. This year we held 44 enrichment opportunities and hosted our first in-person events in both Melbourne and Adelaide. Supporters in 2022 include the Bell Foundation, IMB, Mazda, WOW recruitment and many generous individuals and family trusts

We are an organisation that relies on the support of many pro-bono supporters and volunteers, as well as our financial supporters. Thank you to all our volunteers including coaches, judging panel members, technology and administration support staff. We could not deliver such a successful scholarship program without your enormous support.

We are making a difference in providing high potential, under-resourced girls an opportunity to have futures with prospects of satisfying work, higher incomes and the chance of taking part in creating positive changes for community and society.

FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

It seems impossible to avoid acknowledging the impact that COVID-19 has had – on both a global and a personal scale. During this time, the clear disparity between schools in Australia became even more obvious - and even harder to ignore. None of it was easy for the educators and school staff but it was clear that those students attending a well-resourced school swiftly moved to online learning, but many public-school students were left floundering as their school did not have the resources or personnel to change quickly.

On top of these resource and skills challenges, the schools with high proportions of students from low socio-economic backgrounds also lacked a student body with unencumbered access to technology and a reliable internet connection.

In this context, we saw the Harding Miller Education Foundation Scholarships work harder than ever. The scholarship model designed to be effective in every urban, regional and rural environment in Australia transitioned effectively to a new environment, remote learning. The technological, academic, financial, and personal support provided by this multi-layered and personalised scholarship changed the experience of the scholarship recipients. Instead of the disconnection and dejection sadly experienced by so many Australian students from low socio-economic circumstances, they were connected and bolstered.

Scholarship recipients had a myriad of complex issues to overcome, including homelessness, care of extended family members, poverty, overcrowded homes, and domestic violence. For many of the scholarship recipients, being at school is safer and more hopeful than their homes. In these difficult times, the program team and our volunteer coaches went above and beyond. We significantly increased the amount of contact we had with the girls.

The objective was to identify issues early and where it was possible to alleviate some of the impacts of these difficulties we did. Importantly, the tools of the scholarship kept the students connected to their schools, their teachers, and their peers. It meant they kept engaged with their education and able to progress their academic achievements.

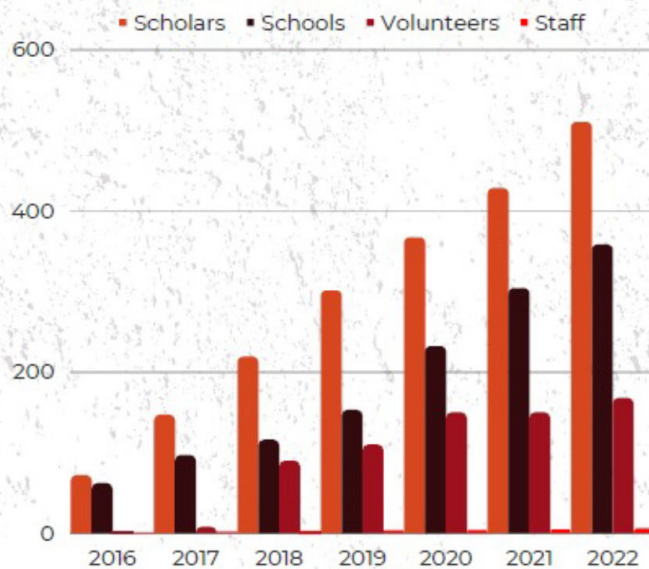


OUR HISTORY



The Harding Miller Education Foundation was established in 2015 and awarded its first scholarship in 2016. Founded by two committed philanthropists, Kim Harding and Irene Miller, they seek to bolster education equity in Australia and, in time, change the face of leadership in Australia.

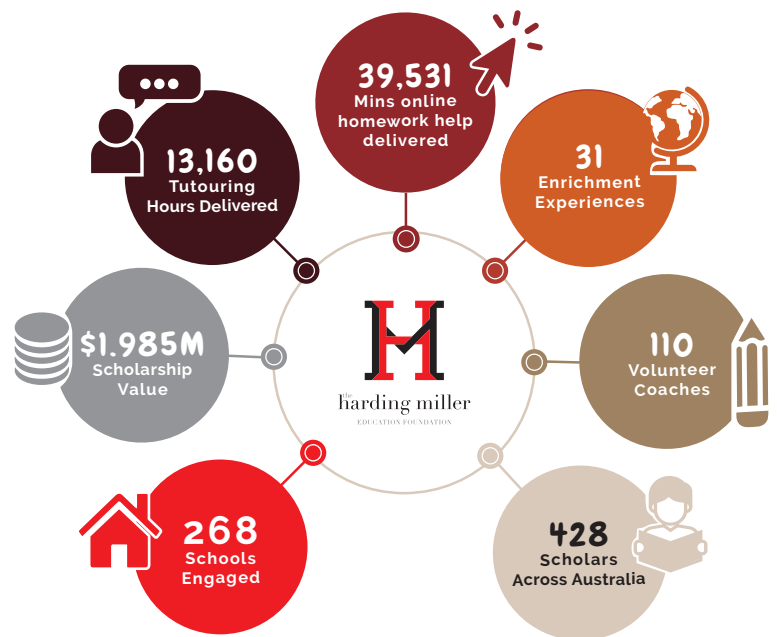
Since its inception, the Foundation has supported more than 800 girls from over 350 Australian public schools.

The program is a multi-layered support framework of academic and technology resources, personal coaching and enrichment, designed to inspire and empower a fresh generation of proud Australian women. Our aim is that through this personalised approach to educating girls we can break the cycle of poverty. Our scholars are future leaders, influencers and innovators of Australia.

BREAKDOWN OF SCHOLARS IN 2022

There was a total of 513 scholars on the program in 2022 from Years 9-12 and they were located in every state and territory of Australia as can be seen from the displayed map.

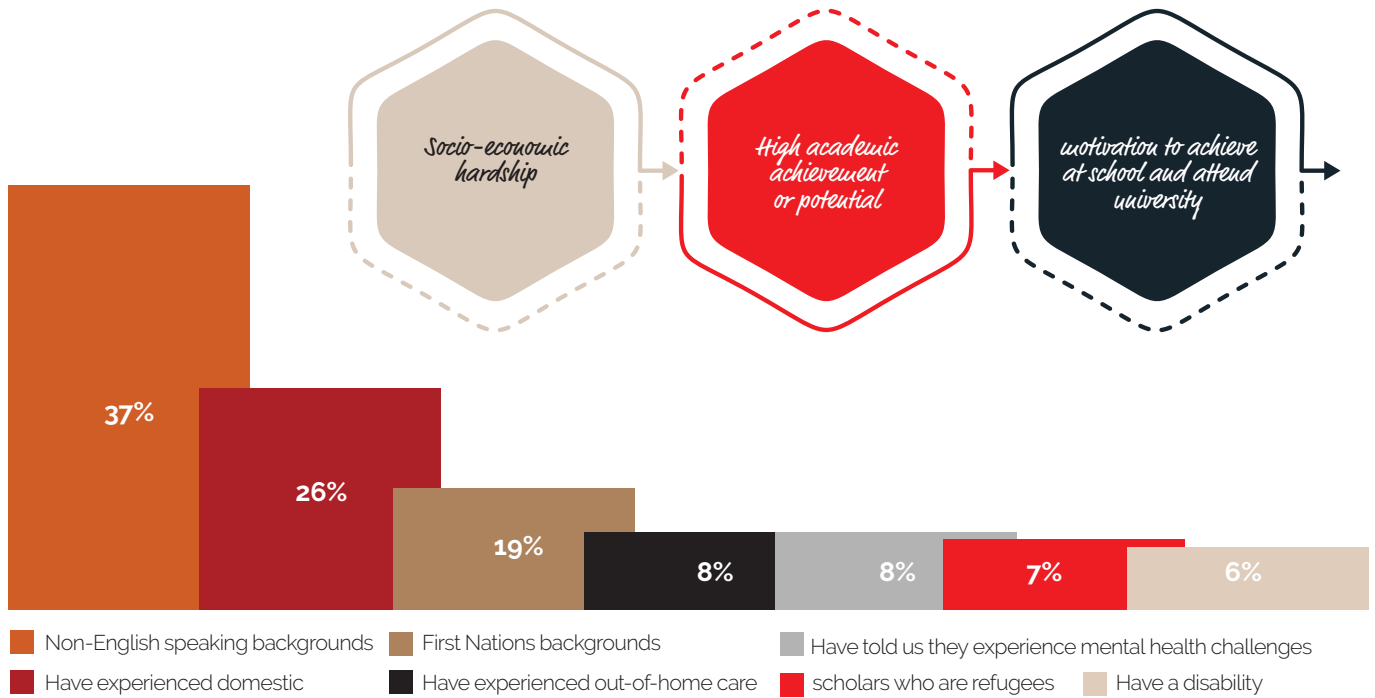
In 2022 we had scholars in Australia as follows:

- 66% scholars in metropolitan areas
- 30% in rural and regional areas
- 4% in remote areas



OUR IMPACT

We support girls from all backgrounds who are studying Year 9 to Year 12 at Australian public schools in every state and territory. We are looking for three attributes when selecting students to be a part of the scholarship program. In 2022 the Harding Miller Education Foundation had many scholars identify from non-English speaking backgrounds, First Nations, those experiencing out of home care and those having directly or indirectly experienced domestic violence.

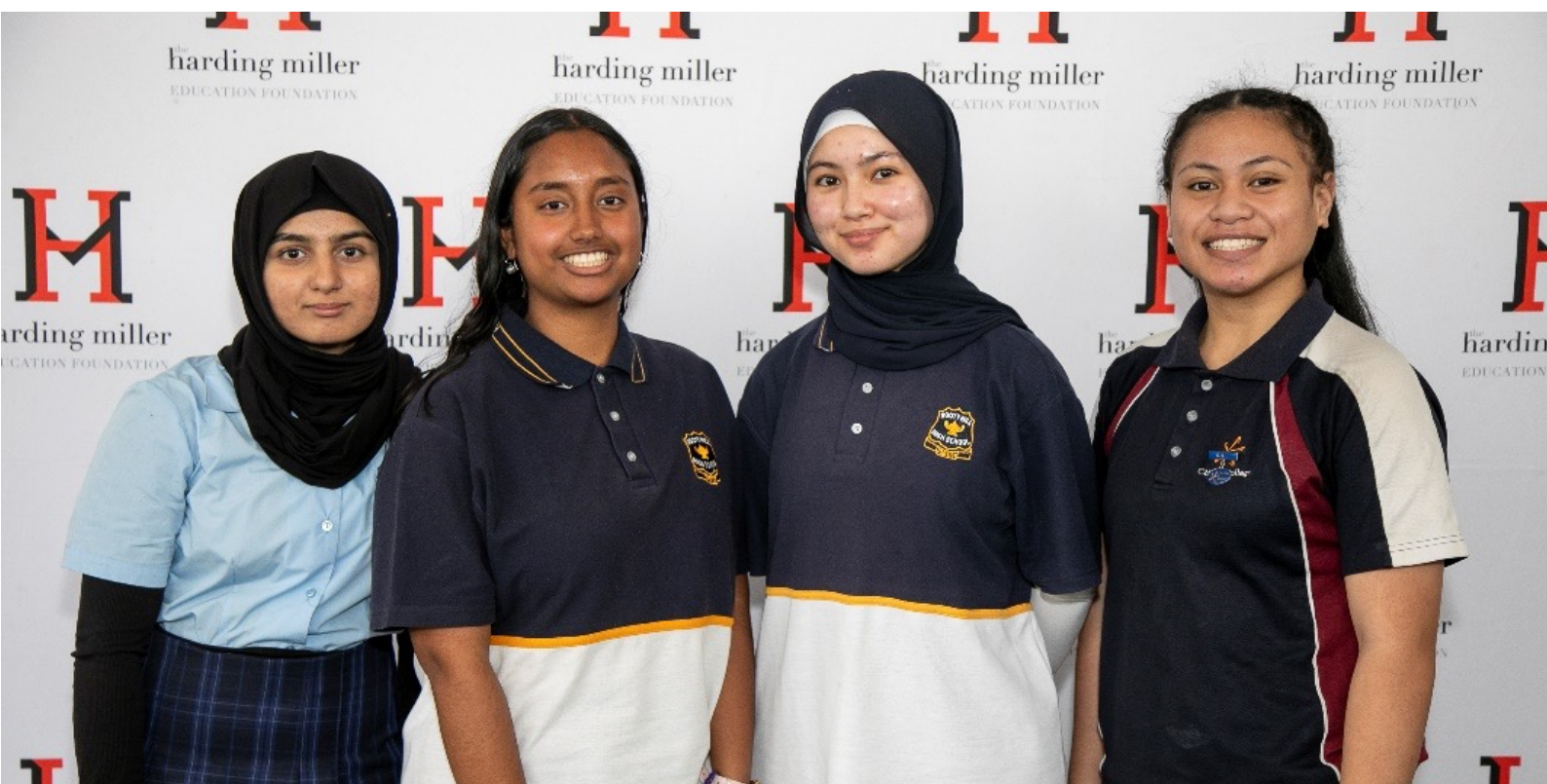

THE CHILDREN WE SUPPORT ARE OUR FIRST PRIORITY

The Harding Miller Education Foundation scholarships provide educational resources and support. However, the Foundation provides much more support than just education. We work with the school, families and community to ensure our scholars are well supported academically and on a personal level. This was evident during the pandemic when Covid-19 had an impact on many students and their families. Our staff, coaches and volunteers supported students and families more than ever by providing extra phone calls and taking a proactive approach to identifying issues and resolving problems early.

Our staff and volunteer coaches nurture and care about the individual student and their families. Welfare checks are regularly carried out and staff are on hand to help resolve any personal issues that arise. Our staff and volunteers also provide assistance and support on a range of matters from medical, help with resources to supporting out of home care and housing matters. In 2022 the Foundation also actively supported a family to ensure that they had adequate housing and basic needs with food and essentials.

The Foundation staff, volunteers and supporters go above and beyond just the scholarship support. The scholars' wellbeing and safety is our first priority. This individualised support is a crucial element of the Harding Miller Education Foundation scholarships.

MEET SOME OF OUR STUDENTS

Lauren McDonald - Year 12, 2022

Lauren attended Macintyre High School which is situated in Inverell in north-eastern New South Wales close to the Queensland border. Lauren lives on a small farm with her father and younger sister. Sadly, Lauren's mother passed away from cancer at the beginning of Lauren's secondary school education. Lauren's mother was a school teacher and after her passing the family was reduced to one income. It was also a time where drought conditions impacted on the family income so Lauren and her younger sister needed to assist their father on the farm.

The school principal initially recommended Lauren for the scholarship and said she was a self-motivated student who had achieved high educational standards despite the need for her to overcome tragic circumstances in her family life.

Lauren participated in all aspects of the scholarship by using her tutoring funds and attended many enrichment activities. At school, Lauren was a very hard working student who also was extensively involved in extra-curriculum and sporting endeavours.

In 2022 Lauren graduated from Macintyre High School as dux and received the Ampol Best All-rounder award. Lauren was also on the NSW Honour Roll Distinguished Achiever roll for students who achieved the highest band possible for one or more course. Lauren is currently at the University of New England studying social science.



Allannah Wilson - Year 11, 2022

Allannah attends Townsville State High School in Queensland and lives with her parents and younger brother in a single income family.

Allannah lives with a birth injury called brachial plexus palsy so she has permanent nerve damage in her neck and shoulder which impacts her daily life. Despite this disability, Allannah is an excellent high achieving student that regularly attains high level results.

Allannah regularly competes as a para-athlete in her local athletics club. She has been using the scholarship resources and regularly attends the enrichment activities offered. Allannah's Year 11 results were excellent – As in English, Chemistry, Biology and Design and Bs in Maths Methods and Physical Education.

Allannah is determined to attend university and study science or medicine. Her school principal has indicated that she is a conscientious and focused student who makes the most of her opportunities.



MEET SOME OF OUR STUDENTS

Razwana Moradi – Year 10, 2022

Razwana attends Salisbury East High School in Adelaide, South Australia and lives with her parents and three siblings. Razwana and her family are refugees and escaped from Pakistan. The family had to travel via Afghanistan and they lived through traumatic circumstances to get to Australia.

Razwana's parents have limited English which has impacted on the family's educational potential. The scholarship has enabled Razwana many opportunities and the freedom to support her studies and her future ambitions for tertiary education.

She is an excellent student who uses all the scholarship resources to her benefit. Razwana also actively participates in the many enrichment activities offered by the scholarship.

Razwana is a motivated high achieving student who attains As in most subjects. She is a very hard working student who has an ambition to attend university to study a Bachelor of Software Engineering (Honours).



Dinusha Perera Morawaka – Year 9, 2022

Dinusha attends Chaffey Secondary College in Mildura, Victoria and is in the accelerated learning program. Dinusha is a gifted student who excels at all her subjects. She is also the President of the Student Representative Council at her school.

Dinusha is on track to succeed at school. She has aspirations to become dux and always tries her best. Dinusha works extremely hard and gains excellent results. She also attends enrichment activities as well as using the scholarship resources including tutoring funds.

Dinusha lives with her parents and younger brother in a single income family. She applied for the scholarship to improve her future as she has dreams to attend university to study medicine.

2022 AWARDS

The Foundation was able to provide 154 scholarships to girls commencing in Year 9 in 2022. Award events were held in Adelaide, Brisbane and Sydney.

The Award events are a significant occasion for the scholars. It is often the first time many girls are introduced to their peers. The Foundation staff welcome the scholars and all girls are provided with information packs and important information. The scholars participate in enrichment and social activities during the day. In the evening, the scholars invite their family to the event and they are welcomed officially into the Harding Miller Education Foundation program. The award ceremony function is a wonderful and inspiring event which features a Welcome to Country, a special guest speaker, entertainment and an official welcome from the Managing Director of the Foundation. It is a very special event where the girls invite their family to attend along with representatives from their school to witness them receiving their award certificates.

Adelaide

The Award Ceremony in Adelaide was held on Monday, 2 May 2022 at the Adelaide Convention Centre. Students from South Australia, Western Australia, Victoria and Tasmania attended.

OUR ENRICHMENT PROGRAM

Our enrichment program continued to grow in 2022 with 44 enrichment events offered to scholars across a range of in-person and virtual experiences. As we emerged out of COVID restrictions, universities and companies began to resume in-person and on-campus university activities. We expanded our offering of opportunities and have developed connections with University of Western Australia, University of Adelaide, University of Tasmania, Queensland University of Technology and also Macquarie University in Sydney.

Some highlights include:

- Hosted our first enrichment events in both Melbourne and Adelaide
- Ernst and Young offered our scholars an opportunity to take part in the launch of their new STEM App - an interactive app that allows students to watch videos, do experiments and earn rewards that can be redeemed for gift vouchers, charitable donations or requests for further learning from EY.
- Ten HMEF scholars were successful in obtaining a place on the Curious Minds STEM Program - a six-month program (including camps and mentoring) created jointly by Australian Maths Trust (AMT) and Australian Science Innovations (ASI)
- Provided our first access to the Arts by offering tickets to attend a Bell Shakespeare play (the Lovers) at the Opera House
- Three HMEF scholars were nominated from Year 11 to participate in the Macquarie University Emerging Leader Program.

YEAR 12 CLASS OF 2022

The Class of 2022 started with 86 girls on the program at the beginning of 2019. They were from 70 schools across four states – New South Wales, Queensland, South Australia, and Victoria. The Class of 2022 graduated from the scholarship program with 73 students completing their HSC (or state- based equivalent) with 67 also receiving an ATAR.

An impressive 31 scholars from the Class of 2022 (42%) advised us that they held school leadership positions during their final year at school – including 13 scholars who were nominated as either school captain or vice-captain. The fact that such a high proportion of our scholars are holding such important roles within their schools shows that they are confident, engaged and displaying significant leadership potential within their school communities.

It also places them at greater advantage (relative to their peers) when applying for early entry and/or scholarships at university by having evidence of leadership, responsibility and a greater ability to manage their time and competing commitments.

OTHER INTERESTING INFORMATION FOR THE CLASS OF 2022 INCLUDES

90% of students are studying at university after school

82% of students applied for a university scholarship

64% received an early offer to go to university

36% of students were the first in their family to finish year 12.

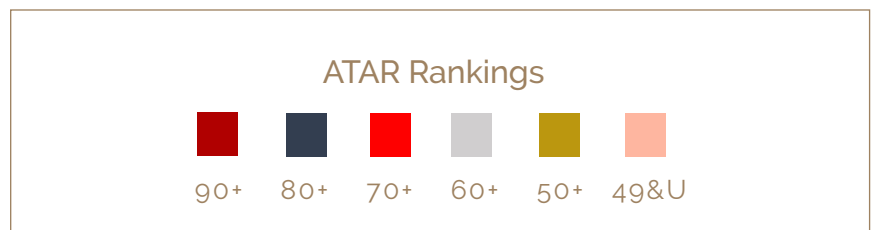
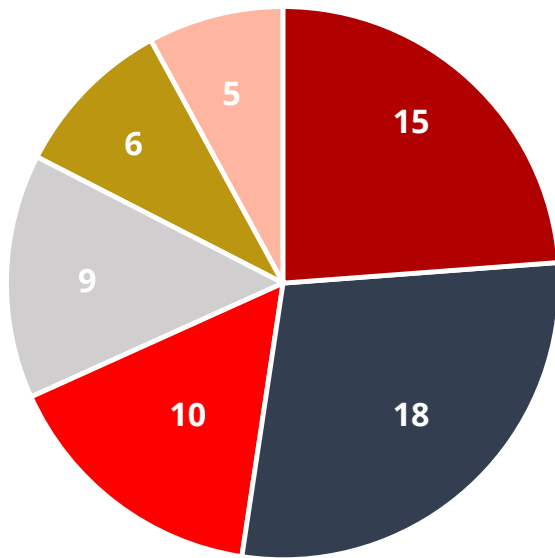
YEAR 12 CLASS OF 2022



YEAR 12 RESULTS

The Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) is a number between 0.00 and 99.95 that indicates a student's position relative to other students. ATARs are calculated in each state to reflect a student's rank against other students in their state and are still the primary factor considered by universities when admitting students to courses.

Sixty-seven of our scholars in the Class of 2022 pursued an ATAR pathway and 63 scholars provided their ATAR results. The highest ATAR received by one of our top scholars was 99.90 – indicating that her performance was in the top 0.10 percent of the entire state of New South Wales.



A SNAPSHOT OF SCHOLAR STORIES

CLASS OF 2022

Jessica Nguyen - Jessica's parents are Vietnamese immigrants. They completed school in Vietnam and do not have any further tertiary education. They have low-paying, unskilled jobs that typically require working afternoon and night shifts. Jessica's father works in a bakery and her mother is a factory worker.

Jessica attended Prairiewood High School and graduated as dux. She also received the Minister's award for student excellence and the Ampol Best All Rounder award. Jessica was on the NSW Honour Roll All Round and Distinguished Achiever Award list. She received the Chancellor's Award Scholarship from the University of Sydney and is studying a Bachelor of Arts/Advanced Studies (International and Global Studies) at Sydney University.

Cherie Puckey - Cherie lives with her parents and both her brothers. Cherie's older brother has an intellectual disability, and her father is also on a disability pension due to personal injury and mental health issues. Cherie's mother is the only family member able to work (as a part-time teacher's aide) and they struggle financially. Cherie attended Loxton High School in South Australia and her school Principal put her forward for the scholarship in 2018. Cherie has

always had a strong interest and aptitude in the areas of STEM and languages and is interested in pursuing a scientific career in physics or chemistry. Cherie achieved a high ATAR and she was accepted into her first preference of studying a Bachelor of Science (Advanced) at the University of Adelaide.

Heidi Schorn - Heidi lives with her parents and three siblings in public housing. One of her siblings has severe autism. Her parents are uneducated, and her father works casually with the Snowy Mountains Council. There is only one income in the family. Heidi attended Tumut High School and the Head Welfare Teacher put her forward for the scholarship in 2018 after she was flagged as a student who would need ongoing assistance.

Heidi made full use of her scholarship and seized every opportunity that was made available to her – including a trip to Sydney to attend a residential program at the University of Sydney in July. Heidi wants to pursue a career as an allied health professional and wants to study at university. Before sitting her HSC exams, Heidi had received early conditional offers from three different universities – including her first preference degree (a double degree in Science and Medical Science) at the Australian National University in Canberra as well as being offered the Bright Horizons Scholarship (\$8,000 per annum) and additional accommodation support.

Ebony Urquhart - Ebony lives with her single mother and two younger siblings. At the time of applying for the scholarship,

she had recently experienced a family breakdown and the whole family was struggling financially. Ebony was our first ever Queensland scholar!

Ebony initially attended Biloela State High School and then moved to Sarina State High School at the end of year 10. Ebony would like to pursue a career in Hospitality (International Tourism/Management) and before sitting her year 12 exams had received an early conditional offer from Southern Cross University.

Christine Tran - When Christine first applied for the HMEF scholarship in 2018 she lived with her parents and older brother in a public housing unit. Her parents are Vietnamese migrants/refugees who were uneducated, unemployed and also experiencing a range of both physical and mental health issues. A short time later, her parents divorced acrimoniously and her home circumstances became worse.

Christine attended Prairiewood High School and always worked hard to improve her circumstances. She has aspired to be the first person in her family to complete secondary school and to go to University. Christine struggled during COVID and often felt like furthering her education was too difficult. With the support of the Foundation and dedicated teachers at her school, Christine thankfully persevered and made it to the end of Year 12. Before sitting her HSC exams, Christine received an early entry offer from the Australian Catholic University to study towards a Diploma in Exercise Science.

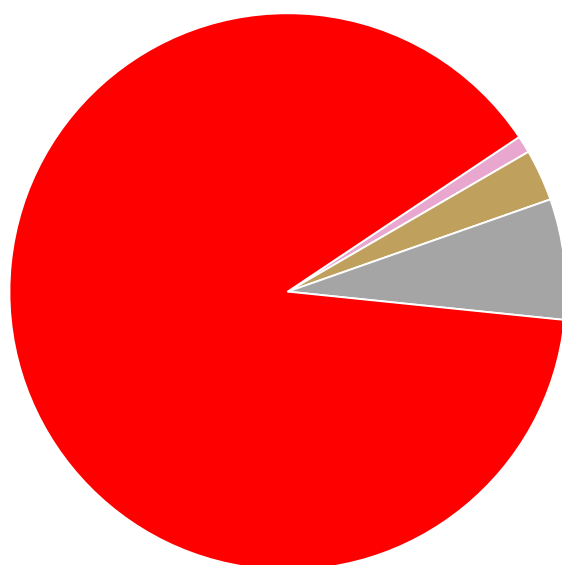

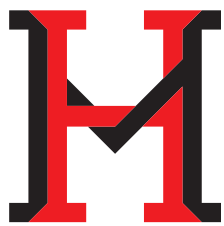
