At the Harding Miller Education Foundation we are creating a positive social impact by lifting educational outcomes of high potential Australian girls experiencing hardship and giving them an opportunity for a bright future.

We provide scholarships to Australian girls with high academic potential who are experiencing hardship. We focus solely on girls at public school, with the intention of bolstering their prospects, confidence and achievements while they stay within their family, within their school and within their community.

The Harding Miller Education Foundation is an Australian charity with a mission to lift the educational and career aspirations of high potential girls who are experiencing disadvantage. We do this by providing female students who are studying in Australian public schools with tools, services and financial support from Year 9 until the completion of their high school years.

The United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) are a blueprint to achieve a better and more sustainable future for all. The UN SDG sustainable goals state that education enables upward socioeconomic mobility that is key to escaping poverty. At the Harding Miller Education Foundation we are taking action on four of the UN SDGs.











WHY DOES THE FOUNDATION ONLY SUPPORT GIRLS?

There is clear evidence of the link between educating women and the alleviation of poverty in society. When women and girls earn income, they reinvest 90% of it into their families, compared with 30-40% for a man. Girls face many barriers to getting an education that boys do not. Educating women results in strong economies, reduced poverty for children and families and will have a significant impact in reducing the educational attain ment gender gap and elevating women to an equal status of men in society.

MESSAGE FROM THE FOUNDERS

It is our great pleasure to introduce the 2023 Harding Miller Education Foundation Annual Report.

In 2023 we were pleased to reach the milestone of awarding our 1,000th scholarship since the Foundation commenced. This is a gratifying achievement and has been possible because of all the supporters of HMEF.

In 2023 we had 619 girls on our program nationally in Years 9-12. This includes 201 new scholarships for girls entering Year 9 in 2023. Of these new scholars, 42% come from a non-English speaking background, 33% are from regional or rural Australia, 25% have experienced domestic violence, 13% are First Nations girls, 10% are from a refugee background and 6% have been in or are in foster care.

We were also honoured that Kim was awarded an Order of Australia in 2023 for her leadership and vision in creating the Harding Miller Education Foundation. This vision has seen the Foundation grow and change the lives of over 1,000 girls across Australia. In 2023 the Foundation team was not only supporting scholars and their parents or carers, but was also managing events, award ceremonies, coach support, donor support and enrichment opportunities for our girls. The work that the Harding Miller team members do is passionate, dedicated, compassionate and generous in spirit. Cara Varian has led the team with energy, enormous intelligence and wisdom.

Multi-grade awards ceremonies were held in Sydney, Brisbane, Melbourne and Perth. Scholars from previous years, who missed out on their Year 9 award ceremonies owing to the pandemic, were invited to this year's award ceremonies. It was wonderful to give these scholars an opportunity to meet their peers, coaches and the Foundation team in person.

We sincerely thank our many enrichment partners and corporate sponsors for giving our scholars life-changing opportunities from learning about various career options including finance and engineering opportunities to university placements and careers covering many avenues from medicine, science, arts, banking to even stock market brokers.

Successful fundraising events were held. These events are integral to our ability to provide scholarships for girls across Australia. Special mention to ANZ Bank and ICAP for your support in 2023. Our coaches and volunteers are also vital to the success of the program. Students come to value the support of their coaches during the four year relationship. Many students have attributed much of their success to the support of their coach. Volunteer work, whether administrative, labour intensive or advisory is also critical to the success of the programs. Many of our volunteer workers are family members of our team members. Our students continue to excel in their academic pursuits. We proudly celebrated the achievement of three outstanding NSW Year 12 scholars who won the prestigious 2023 Minister's Award for Excellence in Student Achievement and another scholar who received a global RISE Scholarship. In addition, a student from Queensland won the Queensland Premier's ANZAC Award.

We were pleased with the results of our Year 12 scholars across Australia. They all deserve every success and we could not be more proud of each and every one of them. These girls have had interrupted years of schooling due to the Covid 19 pandemic, but despite all the challenges they faced, they worked hard and gained excellent results. Congratulations to them all!

We are an organisation that relies on the support of many pro-bono supporters and volunteers, as well as our financial supporters. Thank you for helping us change the trajectory of high-potential, under-resourced girls and giving them an opportunity to succeed and have a bright and prosperous future. Australia will be a better place in the future because of these young women.

OUR HISTORY


The Harding Miller Education Foundation was established in 2015 and awarded its first scholarship in 2016. Founded by two committed philanthropists, Kim Harding and Irene Miller, they seek to bolster education equity in Australia and, in time, change the face of leadership in Australia.

Since its inception, the Foundation has supported more than 1,000 girls from over 400 Australian public schools.

The Harding Miller Education Foundation program gives high potential girls experiencing socio-economic hardship the tools and resources they need to not only complete high school but to reach their potential and build direct pathways to tertiary education. For some girls, there is no financial access to technology or significantly limited access as they often need to share resources with multiple family members.

The Harding Miller Education Foundation scholarship provides the girls with their own devices and educational tools and resources so they can compete with their peers who are more socio-economically advantaged. The Foundation changes the trajectory of these girls who are experiencing hardship and gives them the opportunity of a bright future. The program is a multi-layered support framework of academic and technology resources, personal coaching and enrichment opportunities, designed to inspire and empower a fresh generation of proud Australian women.

Our aim is that through this personalised approach to educating girls we can break the cycle of poverty. Our scholars are future leaders, influencers and innovators of Australia.



BREAKDOWN OF SCHOLARS IN 2023

There was a total of 619 scholars on the program in 2023 from Years 9-12 and they were located in every state and territory of Australia as can be seen from the map shown.

In 2023 we had scholars in Australia as follows:

- 66% scholars in metropolitan areas
- 30% in rural and regional areas
- 4% in remote areas




OUR IMPACT

We provide support and scholarships to girls from all backgrounds who are studying Year 9 to Year 12 at Australian public schools in every state and territory. We are looking for three attributes when selecting students to be a part of the scholarship program. Scholars need to have high academic achievement or potential, motivation to achieve at school and attend university and be experiencing socioeconomic hardship.



The scholars on the scholarship program in 2023 came from a diverse range of backgrounds as illustrated in the chart below.

CONGRATULATIONS TO KIM HARDING OAM

Harding Miller Education Foundation co-founder, Kim Harding, was appointed to the Order of Australia in the 2023 King's Birthday Honours List for her service to the community through charitable organisations.

Kim Harding, along with Irene Miller, through their generosity and vision established the Foundation in 2015. Kim's work at the Harding Miller Education Foundation is phenomenal and sits amongst her other philanthropic interests including marine conservation, homelessness, the prevention of domestic violence and the arts.

This significant recognition through the award of The Medal of the Order of Australia coincides with the Foundation awarding its 1,000th scholarship. That means that the Foundation has awarded more than \$20M worth of scholarships to high-potential Australian girls who don't currently have the resources that they need to achieve their full potential.





Kim and Irene have directly funded the administration and operational costs of the Foundation since its inception in 2015. In addition, they have also personally supported more than 600 scholarships across the nine years. Kim's passion and leadership have also inspired other donors to contribute and hundreds of volunteers to work with the Foundation.

The long-term benefit of the investment of the founders as well as our other donors, volunteers and supporters is not yet visible but as the number of graduating classes grows so do the stories of life-changing impact. A thousand scholarships mean a thousand stories... so far.

Harding Miller scholars have a bright future because of the vision and generosity of our founders who are changing the trajectory of high-potential but under-resourced girls and giving them a bright future to follow their dreams of tertiary studies and successful lives.

Congratulations to three NSW Year 12 scholarship recipients - Khawlah Albaf, C-K Crosbie and Kiara Risnes, who each received the prestigious NSW Minister's Award for Excellence in Student Achievement on 5 September 2023.

The Award ceremony was hosted by the NSW Public Education Foundation on behalf of the Deputy Premier and Minister for Education and Early Learning, the Hon Prue Car MP, and the Secretary of the NSW Department of Education, Mr Murat Dizdar PSM. The awards are held each year and acknowledge the outstanding achievements of schools, students, teachers, employees and parents in the NSW public education sector. The Premier's Anzac Prize is a highly enriching initiative tailored for young individuals who are passionate about history. Those who receive the prize engage in activities that contribute to developing their understanding of the Anzac spirit and its contemporary significance, both in Australia and globally. As part of the program, Sophie will set off for Brisbane to participate in a two-day young historians workshop hosted by the State Library of Queensland and then in 2024 will tour through Belgium, France and the UK, where she will explore important memorial sites from World War I and II.

As a particular highlight of this tour, Sophie will represent the Queensland Department of Education during the Anzac Day dawn service at the Australian War Memorial in Villers-Bretonneux, France. Before the tour, Sophie will also engage in research on two Anzac veterans, about whom she will deliver eulogies during the European tour. In addition, Sophie will be fundraising for Mates4Mates, an organisation supporting Australian veterans and their families who have sustained injuries due to their military service. Sophie states that she is honoured to have this opportunity as learning about Australia's military history has always been close to her heart.

In 2023 we celebrated 201 new scholars from every state and territory of Australia at four events which were held in Perth, Melbourne, Brisbane and Sydney. In addition, senior scholars in years 11 and 12 were also invited to attend the 2023 event if they missed out in Year 9 due to Covid.

The award events are a significant occasion for our scholars and it is often the first time many girls are introduced to their peers, coaches and members of the foundation. They are not simply events to celebrate the achievements of wonderful scholars from across Australia, they are also an opportunity for scholars to gain insights and build networks with peers and people from different backgrounds.

The Foundation staff welcome the scholars and all girls participate in enrichment and social activities during the day. In the evening, the scholars invite their family to join the event where they are welcomed officially into the Harding Miller Education Foundation program.

The evening award ceremony function is a wonderful and inspiring event which features a Welcome to Country, special guest speakers, entertainment and an official welcome from the Managing Director of the Foundation.



PERTH

The first awards ceremony for the year was held in Perth on 3 April 2023 at the University of Western Australia. Thirty-one scholars attended the event from all across Western Australia.









MELBOURNE

Scholars from Victoria, South Australia, Tasmania and the Australian Capital Territory attended the awards event in Melbourne on 8 May 2023. The event was held at the State Library Victoria and 72 scholars attended the event.











BRISBANE

The Brisbane Awards event was held on 22 May 2023 at the State Library of Queensland and 83 Queensland-based scholars attended the event.











SYDNEY

On 26 June 2023 the Sydney Awards event was held at the Sofitel Hotel Wentworth and was attended by 110 scholars from across NSW and the Northern Territory. It was the largest awards event we have held, with over 300 guests in attendance.













OUR ENRICHMENT PROGRAM

Our enrichment program continued to grow in 2023, with 39 enrichment events offered to scholars across a range of in-person and virtual experiences. We continued the trend of increasing both the number and scope of enrichment opportunities provided to scholars during 2023, with a total of 2,510 hours of opportunities for the year across a range of in-person and virtual experiences.

YEAR 12 CLASS OF 2023

OTHER INTERESTING INFORMATION ABOUT THE CLASS OF 2023 INCLUDES,

The Class of 2023 started with 138 girls on the program at the beginning of 2020. They attended 91 different schools across all states and territories – except for the ACT. The Class of 2023 graduated from the scholarship program with 115 students completing their schooling with 110 also receiving an ATAR.

An impressive number of 46 scholars from the Class of 2023 (40%) advised us that they held school leadership positions during their final year at school – including the 17 scholars who were nominated as either school captain or vice captain.

The fact that such a high proportion of our scholars are holding such important roles within their schools shows that they are confident, engaged and displaying significant leadership potential within their school communities. Further, it places them at greater advantage (relative to their peers) when applying for early entry and/or scholarships at university by having evidence of leadership, responsibility, time management, and the ability to cope with competing commitments.



YEAR 12 RESULTS

An outstanding 36% of the 55 Harding Miller education scholarship recipients who sat their Higher School Certificate exams in New South Wales this year have been recognised on the HSC Honour Roll. One of our Year 12 scholars was awarded All Rounder, while another was awarded Top Achiever. Twenty-one scholars were awarded Distinguished Achiever. We also had two Victorian scholars distinguished on the VCE Honour Roll.



ATAR **RESULTS**

The Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) is a number between 0.00 and 99.95 that indicates a student's position relative to other students. ATARs are calculated in each state to reflect a student's rank against other students in their state and are still the primary factor considered by universities when admitting students to courses.

One hundred and ten of our scholars in the Class of 2023 pursued an ATAR pathway and 98 scholars provided their ATAR results. The highest ATAR received by one of our top scholars was 98.95 - indicating that her performance was in the top 1.05 percent of the entire state of New South Wales.

Overall, 53% of our Year 12 scholars in 2023 received an ATAR in the top 20% of the state.

She was awarded a Distinguished Achiever award on the 2023 NSW Honour Roll as she achieved a result in the highest band for Mathematics Extension 1 and Mathematics Extension 2. Sumedha received an early offer from the University of New South Wales to study a Bachelor of Engineering and has accepted this offer. More recently Sumedha received the WIE FEAS (Women in Engineering Faculty of Engineering Admissions Scheme) Scholarship valued at \$5,000.

Dawnellen

Dawnellen lives in a small, remote town in the Northern Territory and attended Katherine High School where she was School Vice Captain and Dux of her year. She lives with her grandmother and they experience hardship living off a low income. Dawnellen gives back to her community volunteering at the hospital and through the Red Cross. She made excellent use of her scholarship tools and attended numerous online enrichment opportunities.

Dawnellen has moved to Melbourne and is currently studying Occupational Therapy at Monash University. She is the first in her family to attend university. When she completes her degree, Dawnellen plans to work in remote Australia.

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Sapphire

Sapphire attended Canley Vale High School and was a House Captain in Year 12. Her father was a refugee and her mother was an immigrant from Vietnam and they do not speak English fluently. Her mother cares for her father due to his injuries so both parents are unemployed and the family experiences socioeconomic hardship. Sapphire received a Harding Miller Education Foundation scholarship because she showed high academic results and potential, she had strong goals and demonstrated the motivation to reach them.

In Year 8 Sapphire stated that her goal was to study health at the University of Sydney. Sapphire had a number of early entry offers at a range of universities and is now studying a Bachelor of Applied Health (Occupational Therapy) at the University of Sydney.

Bathsheba

Bathsheba was born in a refugee camp in Thailand. Her parents came to Australia seeking a better life for their eight children, free from persecution. Bathsheba is passionate about music just like her father and wants to be a role model for her younger siblings and other members of her community. She attended Condell Park High School and was School Captain in Year 12.

Bathsheba is currently studying a Bachelor of Business and Bachelor of Arts at Macquarie University. She is the first person in her family to have the opportunity to study at university and she knows it makes her parents very proud



Gwen

When Gwen applied for the scholarship she was hoping to study education. A proud First Nations woman, Gwen grew up in a small rural town with her parents and two siblings facing significant socioeconomic hardship. Gwen graduated from Dungog High School as Dux in 2023.

Gwen is pursuing a Bachelor of Laws and Bachelor of Science, majoring in Psychology through the Dalyell Stream at the University of Sydney. She was recently awarded the Judge Ralph J Perdriau Scholarship for the Bachelor of Laws and has started a position in legal research. In Year 12, Gwen was on the NSW Honour Roll as well as being school Vice Captain, AECG President and an involved member of her SRC. She represented rural youth on a national level through the Rural Ambassador Program with a focus on furthering opportunities and teaching in rural education.

Gwen also received the Premier's Anzac Memorial Scholarship. In 2022 Gwen was Dungog's Young Citizen of the Year. In 2023, Gwen's piece on 'How Diverse Young Leaders Strengthen Rural Communities' won her the Country to Canberra's Leadership Competition and a trip to the ACT to cultivate her leadership skills.


